Education & Representation

3 R's that Black deaf youth don't experience in the European education system.

- Rigour
- Relevance
- Relationship.

Education must be rigorous and relevant, but most importantly... the educator must have a relationship with the student.

No relationship = No learning

Whenever you see a Black deaf child academically underperforming, it's because the teachers do not have a vested interest in that child.

Very FEW Black deaf youth in Europe enter 3rd level education, proving that the lack of Black deaf teachers and role models significantly affects the identity, communication and education of Black deaf youth.

Sign Language & Community

- According to the European Union of the Deaf, there are approximately 80,000 deaf people who use sign language in Europe.
- The lack of representation and cultural understanding in important community spaces can create a challenging environment for Black deaf children in predominantly white deaf communities.
- All the countries in Europe have their own sign language which limits Black deaf people especially youth who are not given enough opportunities to meet.

Identity & Heritage

"Growing up in a predominantly white environment can have negative psychological consequences for Black youth, including decreased self esteem and a heightened sense of racial identity confusion."

"Black Deaf youth often encounter difficulties in schools and other institutions because they are forced to navigate spaces where their race and deafness intersect. They are further disadvantaged by the absence of Black Deaf teachers, leaders, and role models who share their cultural and linguistic background. This can result in a sense of cultural discontinuity and isolation, which can have negative impacts on their sense of self and well-being"

Our mission is to unify across differences and advance belonging within the deaf community.

Our vision is to spark a movement of unity and shared understanding through innovative digital media, intercultural education and events.



In 2021 we hosted;

- 24 Anti-racism, raciolinguistics and DEI workshops for Sign Language Interpreting companies, youth organisations, deaf schools, universities and companies in 8 European countries.
- Participated in numerous digital panel discussions with the Black deaf community in around the world and wrote a 13 chapter elearning course for Deaf Australia on antiracism issues and global development.
- Whilst also delivering a little something for the culture, through podcasts, Black deaf empowerment brunches and so on


